

How Do You Determine if a Cat is Lost?

If the cat appears healthy...

Often times if a cat looks healthy and their fur looks clean and well kept, they are likely being taken care of someone (if not many people.)

If the cat is friendly...

Cats that are friendly are likely a resident's cat who is just out for a stroll and is not actually a lost cat.

If the cat is ear-tipped...

Cats that have been ear-tipped are community cats that have been humanely trapped, vaccinated, microchipped, spayed or neutered, and returned to outdoor homes to live out their lives.

Check with neighbors!

Ask your neighbors if the cat is familiar to them or if it may even be theirs. You can also observe the cat's behavior and watch if they seem to return to the same home.

Please don't take cats away from their homes.

Cats in the community that have caretakers are much more likely to find their own way home if they remain where they are found.

Our shelter's return to owner rate for cats is only 2.7%.

When to Bring a Cat to the Shelter?

If a loose cat in your neighborhood appears to be injured, sick, or in immediate danger, please bring them to our shelter to receive the care they need.

Caring for Cats in Your Community

- Remove any uneaten food within 30 minutes. Leaving food out can attract insects and wildlife.
- Provide fresh water.
- Choose one place to feed and keep it clean. We recommend creating a "feeding area" for all food dishes.
- Keep everything clean.
- Create litter areas using sand. You can build a box with 2' x 4's or use a sandbox. A sandbox helps deter cats from relieving themselves in neighborhood gardens. Be sure the litter area is in a quiet, sheltered space and clean it regularly.
- Provide safe shelters. Cats need warm, dry places that are removed from populated areas.

- A true, feral cat
- An outdoor only, un-owned cat
- A barn cat that is a true barn cat
