

The cats' living quarters have a spacious sleeping/eating area in addition to a private loo, which is separated by a portal. Each adoptable cat is given a curtain for quiet time and can be brought to one of our cat visitation rooms in order to greet potential adopters and put their best selves forward.

In this quieter environment, adoptable cats are less stressed out and are therefore much healthier! Our cats are also able to display more natural and relaxed behaviors when not put on edge by barking. It's a win-win all around, as their more relaxed state increases the likelihood of adoption.

Most people are familiar with the work we do in our facility in finding displaced pets permanent, loving homes, but they are not always aware of the behind-thescenes efforts to support those in need. Made possible by the generosity of the Milgard Foundation, our Community Outreach Program strives to build the relationships between people and pets by going beyond our walls, identifying the needs in our community, and meeting people in their comfort zone.

Our goal is to keep pets in their own home, which in turn limits

the number of surrendered pets ending up here at the Society As we have worked closely with community members, our staff and volunteers have learned that most people would do almost anything to keep their pet and often only need short-term support to make that possible.

The Society offers several free and low-cost programs to help keep pets in the homes where they are loved. We have found that the approach of helping these families cover the costs and supplies associated with pet ownership not only benefits the animals, but it can also be a major advantage to people coping with the chronic stresses of poverty. Families who need a helping hand with a pet should check out:



Our Cinderella Program works to keep Spay/Neuter costs low to help curb pet overpopulation in our community.

This program offers families low cost spay/neuter vouchers for dogs, cats, and rabbits. The program has been helping reduce pet overpopulation since 1992.

Pet Food Pantry

This program serves donated pet meals to families who need temporary assistance feeding their pets. People who are homebound can also have pet

temporary assistance feeding their pets. People who are homebound can also have pet meals delivered. Our Pet Food Pantry is open from noon to 4:00 pm Monday through Friday and from 9:00 to 11:00 am on Saturday. The Society is closed on Sundays.

The Pet Food Pantry distributes 12,000 lbs of pet food and feeds more than 400 pets a month

This program reaches out to Tacoma's underserved neighborhoods to provide free veterinary resources and education though door-to-door outreach. Families living in 98404 and 98418 zip codes will be visited by caring volunteers and staff and are offered pet resources such as free spay/neuter, behavioral training, and pet supplies.

Phyllis A. Holloway 1938 - 2018

Phyllis was born in Wichita, KA in 1938. She settled in Lakewood and was the COO and later president for TriArc Electric Supply for many years.

"She was a wonderful volunteer and very generous, especially during the building of our remodeled/renovated Humane Society, providing all electrical supplies at cost," former Executive Director Jeanne H. Werner-Spaulding said.

Phyllis loved animals, children, and BINGO. She was also a benefactor for St. Jude's Research Hospital. To honor her life, donations may be made to either St. Jude's Research Hospital or the Humane Society for Tacoma and Pierce County.





Shirley Willis Bushnell 1929 - 2018

This year marked Shirley's 30th anniversary as a member of Kiwanis; she joined the Kiwanis Club of Tacoma shortly after women became accepted for membership. Shirley was also the first woman to serve as president of the Tacoma Club and was honored by being chosen as the club's recipient of the Hixon Award. She subsequently had the pleasure of serving two successive years as president of the Vashon Island Club.


Professionally, Shirley had been in the fundraising business for four decades, first at Stanford University, after a stint as Assistant Dean of Students, and then for 20 years at the University of Puget Sound as Vice President for University Relations, heading up a \$45 million capital campaign. Toward the end of her tenure at UPS, Shirley established a fundraising consulting firm under the name of Bushnell-Baranger and worked with numerous organizations. Two of her major long-term projects in the dual role of consultant and campaign director were the home for the Vashon Community Care Center and our very own Humane Society for Tacoma and Pierce County building.

Shirley was always devoted to her family and is survived by her loving daughters Beckie Krantz, Kim Laderriere, and Poppy Bushnell, six grandchildren, and six great-grandchildren.





The Itty Bitty Kitty Committee Cat Colony Room is meowificant!

In July of 2016, The Itty Bitty Kitty Committee cat centric blog rallied its followers to raise funds for a cat colony room. Now their dream is a reality, and our cats are simply in heaven in their new extra large free range room!

The Itty Bitty Kitty Committee Cat Colony Room holds up to eight cats comfortably with lots of leg room! This room also has cool furniture by Crijo, and our cats can choose to burrow in or climb on top of the equipment. The cats also have beds and hiding cubes aplenty where they can sleep or roam around for playing, stretching, or relaxing. The key is to give as many options as possible so that every cat has the chance to best express themselves.

Take, for instance, Armand and Melo pictured on the right. Beautiful Melo was owner surrendered and is thus a little hesitant, feeling safest when only partially visible. Yet the cutout lets her get used to seeing new potential family members and allows her time to get more comfortable. Armand on the other hand is a showboat, demonstrated by his climbing to the tippy top of the furniture; he owns The Itty Bitty Kitty Committee Cat Colony Room. Both cats were able to find the ideal homes just days after taking up temporary residence in the space!

By encouraging cats to display natural feline behaviors, we're reducing stress, which decreases aggression, improves appetite, and curbs urine spraying.

Moreover, cats enjoying their freedom makes for ideal matchmaking, as the space gives people insight about how a cat may act in their new home. So if you're looking to adopt a cat, be sure to swing by The Itty Bitty Kitty Committee Cat Colony Room and visit with the many cats in their element!

With the Cat Foster Care area now upstairs, the space has been repurposed for Dog Services, and the team is loving the new digs! Cecily Joque, Dog Services Lead, describes the new Dog Behavior Room as "much quieter and out of the way. Everything about the room will really benefit a lot of dogs."

Thanks to the dedicated space, Cecily and her team can more comfortably and safely facilitate dog foster visitations. The larger room is also better for processing intake especially when it comes to a litter of puppies. An exam table, fridge for vaccines, and space for large crates complete the Dog Behavior Room.

Big changes for big dogs

What's more, the Dog Services team can have multiple dogs in at once if needed with space enough for each pooch to spread out and relax. The assessment process has further expanded to better help staff evaluate how a potentially adoptable dog would possibly react to another dog. From a distance, Cecily's large stuffed animal dog looks like a bonafide canine, and the real dog's initial reactions can be very telling. As demonstrated in the photo to the right, Lahi's straight on contact shows he isn't afraid of the stuffed dog and may very well be interested in social interaction with other large dogs.

More opportunities for enrichment are possible, too! Cecily shared how she's looking forward to more volunteer-led Clicker training (a science-based method to help with communication) fun days and buddy play dates.

While all dog stand to benefit from the Dog Behavior Room, our larger often long-term canines are getting the most out of the space.

Perro, for one, is a shining testament of how well the room is working. Whereas the Pit Bull would shut down in nervousness and shyness in the kennel environment, the Dog Behavior Room has become his happy place. He now has the room to relax and plenty of chewies to completely decompress. And kennel lead Brandy Boston, was able to crate train him in just three days! Staff has additionally been able to capture Perro's more affectionate and loving side on camera, and he is now a strong candidate for world-famous Best Friends Animal Society's adoption program!
